

Prevent Resources for Schools and Colleges

- www.educateagainsthate.com is the Government website providing practical advice to parents, teachers and school leaders on protecting children from extremism and radicalisation. The website includes links to a range of useful resources, good practice examples and suggested curriculum content.
- <https://www.elearning.prevent.homeoffice.gov.uk> is a 45-minute, Home Office Learning package designed for all school staff, volunteers and governors. It uses some of the video resources used in the WRAP sessions provided to Designated Safeguarding Leads.
- <http://www.npcc.police.uk/CounterTerrorism/ACTforYouth.aspx> contains resources from the National Police Chiefs Council to help schools and youth organisations take terrorism safety advice to children and young people. The classroom materials are aimed at 11 to 16 year olds and include lesson plans, posters and animations. Materials are also provided for youth organisations.

There is a range of supportive material on the website which also provides links to partner agencies to help people spot the signs of radicalisation at an early stage and provide communities with advice as to what to do.
- Show Racism the Red Card: [Islamophobia education pack](#) - This education pack is intended to accompany the Show Racism the Red Card "Islamophobia" DVD. The activities have been designed to help young people (from Key Stage 2 to adulthood) challenge stereotypes and prejudice towards Muslims.

- [The FREE Initiative](#): A pan-European resource to offer practical guidance on countering far-right extremism across Europe. It aims to inspire and promote cross-border learning among those working against violent far-right extremism.
- [The Holocaust Centre](#): Hosts outreach programmes and teaching materials to educate young people about the Holocaust and share lessons on combating prejudice and racism.
- [1001 Inventions](#): This website examines the degree of shared heritage between the Muslim community and other communities in the UK, Europe and across the World.
- [Prevent for Schools](#) is a website produced by the Lancashire Prevent in Education Group which provides resources for their local schools across all phases along with a page linking to other resources available nationally.
- [The PSHE association](#) has provided four lesson plans for Key Stage 4 focussing on addressing extremism and radicalisation of all kinds.
