Managed Move Scheme

Principles:

- One of a range of strategies to prevent Permanent Exclusion (PEX) offering a fresh start where this is in the best interests of the child
- Decision to explore a Managed Move (MM) based on child's needs
- One strategy in a toolkit of potential school interventions/support
- Only considered where school based interventions/support have not improved situation
- Most effective as a tool for early intervention
- Pupil not reached point where PEX is unavoidable
- PEX may be only option in response to one off high level incidents
- Not an appropriate strategy for some children
- Management of risk and sharing of full information between schools essential
- All parties (schools, child and parents/carers and LA) must be in agreement
- Expectation that schools transfer balance of pupil funding when MM confirmed
- LA provides transport where over statutory distance to any of 4 nearest schools
- All schools including academies **must** participate as part of Norfolk's fair access protocol
- MM cannot override parents right to express preference(s) to transfer school
- Pupils with EHCP/Statement EHCP review rather than MM
- LAC pupils discuss concerns and potential transfer with Virtual School Adviser

Process:

- Headteacher/Head of School reviews evidence and determines whether a MM appropriate
- Senior member of school staff meets with parents to explain why MM being considered and the process and progresses if parent(s) agree
- LA Admissions confirms 4 nearest schools (or all within statutory walking distance) AND previous MM's in/out of identified schools – copied to all identified schools.
- Headteacher/Head of School makes case to Fair Access team for more schools to be included
 if there are concerns in the specific case with nearest schools where Fair Access team agree
 transport will be provided
- H/t/HoS contacts preferred school (taking account of local issues, previous MMs, parent views and transport implications) sharing all behavioural and other relevant information
- LA able to remind schools of duty to participate but cannot direct a school to take a specific child (see dispute resolution)
- Where MM accepted formal "behaviour trial" prepared agreement signed by parent, current school, receiving school and Fair Access Team (NB including transport request where relevant)
- Behaviour trials to operate for a minimum of 8 school weeks with extension of up to a further 6 school weeks with agreement of all parties
- Joint meeting between current and trial school before trial starts to review full behavioural and all other relevant information to finalise formal risk assessment and to agree transition.
- Good practice for a member of support staff from current school to directly support the student to ensure smooth transition
- Pupil remains on roll at current school educated off-site during trial with current school notified on a weekly basis of attendance at the trial school and any other issues.
- Trial terminated if serious behaviour breach or repeated low level breaches or repeated failure to engage in lessons
- Transfer to roll of trial school at end of behaviour trial where successful
- Trial potentially extended if low level behavioural concerns and/or significant illness/injury
 results in a significant period(s) of absence during the trial (with appropriate medical evidence)
 but otherwise fails if attendance below persistent absence threshold
- Fair Access team maintains data of managed moves published for schools and governors
