News and Christmas Delivery

Upcoming Webinars

Prevent Duty

23 January 2025 13:30-15:00

This 90-minute webinar is for trained DSLs. It does not replace DSL refresher training.

This webinar will be delivered by Russell Cole, Norfolk's Preventing Radicalisation Coordinator and supported by members of the Education Safeguarding Team. This session is intended for organisations or individuals to update knowledge in line with the Prevent duty and focus on your local needs.

Focus will be given to the strategic requirements of providers as well as emerging good practices in the operational implementation of the new Prevent Duty, building on material provided by the DfE providing greater local detail.

The session will cover the following:

- Overview of the updated Prevent duty, where we are locally.
- The Contest strategy, how to interpret risks you may encounter and overlay this with knowledge of local trends and issues.
- Focus on online extremist ideology, virtual platforms being the 'New frontier'. What 'Permissive spaces' entail for us in Norfolk.
- Building resilience in education settings, what works and supporting material.
- Case studies and examples of relevant incidents experienced in Norfolk.
- Overview of Notice, Check Share including signs and symptoms that could be evident in your community spaces. Your responsibilities.
- Refresher of the referral process, tools to support your roles.
- · Where to go for additional information and other training packages, Ofsted trends around Prevent.
- Opportunity for additional questions.

Learning Outcomes

At the end of this session colleagues will have:

- An improved understanding of the Prevent duty where we are in 2025.
- An improved understanding of how to translate the Prevent duty into local actions, overview of refreshed policy requirements.
- Increased understanding of ideologies of concern, what makes a good Prevent referral, tips to prepare for inspections.
- Help equip staff with a clear understanding of responsibilities linked to changes in Prevent.
- What the relevant international, national and local threats.
- Increased confidence around reporting and where to secure additional support.
- The chance to explore questions about the Prevent Duty or other issues linked to extremism & terrorism in your local settings.

There will be an opportunity to ask questions, alternatively questions that cannot be answered during the 90 minutes will be addressed by e-mail after the event.

The webinar will take place via Microsoft Teams; however, you do not need to have this application on your laptop. If you do not, then the webinar will open in an internet browser.

Norfolk Graded Care Profile Tool Training (Neglect)

Many DSLs and pastoral staff undertook Graded Care Profile training last academic year with 219 schools and colleges with trained staff. However, if you have not completed the training and wish to do so, we are now offering spring term dates.

The training is primarily designed for Designated Safeguarding Leads to implement the use of the Graded Care Profile and cascade the information to relevant staff. Those pastoral staff who work directly with families are also welcome to attend the training.

This free half day course will cover what neglect is and how the updated Graded Care Profile tool should be used effectively to measure and target the quality and level of care given to children by their parents or carers.

Outcomes:

- Understand what neglect is and how it is categorised Explain the Norfolk Graded Care Profile and how it can be used to measure and target the quality and level of care given to children by their parents
- Consider how this can be used to effect change in parental behaviours
- Demonstrate a practical application of the tool using a case study
- Confidence in utilising the Norfolk Graded Care Profile tool when working with partners to ensure a multi-agency approach to using the tool with families.

Appropriate Language: Child Exploitation

The Children's Society updated the 'Appropriate Language' guidance in November 2024 to support all professionals in their practice to eradicate victim blaming language and ensure a safeguarding first response to children who are at risk of exploitation.

The guide helps practitioners to understand the impact of inappropriate language, contains an inappropriate terms index with suggested alternatives.

Adultification Training

Norfolk Safeguarding Children Partnership Adultification Training - Spring 2025. This workshop is aimed at practitioners from across the multi-agency safeguarding network who are working in safeguarding children in Norfolk.

This workshop explores the concept of 'adultification' from both a research and practice perspective. This session uses case studies, small group discussions and serious case review findings to explore how adultification manifests in practice and its potentially life-long impact. Gangs, County Lines and Serious Youth Violence-Awareness and Preventative - St Giles SOS+

2 hours - Delivered via Microsoft Teams

St Giles SOS+ Service has been commissioned to deliver a virtual session for professionals on gang and youth violence including females in gangs. This session is 2 hours long and consists of speakers utilising their lived experience within the criminal justice system to unpack and explore the realities and consequences of county lines drug smuggling, gang involvement, criminal exploitation, and serious youth violence. It looks at Child Criminal Exploitation, with a focus on county lines. Including an individual's testimony, as well as definitions, signs & indicators, realities, and ways to support, this session is suitable for anyone working with, or supporting young people

By attending the session, participants will:

- have an improved understanding of gang involvement, exploitation, violence and keeping safe online.
- have an understanding of the risk factors facing young people.
- improved understanding to support informed and relevant conversations with young people about making positive choices.

Child sexual abuse in the family environment: New review from the Child Safeguarding Practice Review Panel

In November 2024, the Child Safeguarding Practice Review Panel published the results of their national review into child sexual abuse within the family environment.

The national review analysed 136 serious child safeguarding incidents, and 41 related serious case reviews (SCRs) and local child safeguarding practice reviews (LCSPRs).

It explores the specific challenges which feature in the identification, assessment, and response to child sexual abuse within the family environment.

It sets out 10 recommendations and findings for national government and local safeguarding partners to protect children at risk.

Norfolk's Local Plan For Multi-Agency Safeguarding Arrangements (MASA) 2024

Today, 25th November 2024, we published Norfolk's MASA which sets out how the statutory partners work together to keep children safe from harm. This iteration of the plan is fully compliant with Working Together 2023 and includes details of our Lead and Delegated Statutory partners as well as more information on how education supports the arrangements as well as the crucial role that data and intelligence plays in our safeguarding work.

Norfolk's Joint Agency Group Supervision: QA and Monitoring System (Norfolk Safeguarding Children Partnership)

Dear Wider Partners.

We are pleased to announce the launch of the revised model of Joint Agency Group Supervision (JAGS).

The Norfolk Safeguarding Children Partnership has recently undertaken some work to scrutinise how JAGS were operating and found that in practice many JAGS had strayed from the fidelity of the model becoming more like a professional meeting with a focus on case management (sometimes called a Team Around the Child Supervision or TACS) - the core purpose of a JAGS had been lost.

As a reminder, the purpose of a JAGS is to provide a reflective safe space for multi-agency practitioners where the very challenging work of safeguarding children, and the emotional impact of this work, is understood, contained and held. It is well documented in research and Child Safeguarding Practice Reviews, that if we are to collectively safeguard children we must support our most precious resource – you – by providing a safe space to pause and reflect together.

Much work has now been completed to return JAGS to the fidelity of the model.

There is a <u>revised procedure</u>, practice guidance and a pool of multi- agency practitioners trained to be independent JAGS facilitators and provide a consistent experience for participants.

The process of requesting a JAGS has been centralised through the NSCP who will manage the process of requesting a JAGS and appointing an independent JAGS facilitator – only those who have been trained will be appointed to facilitate a JAGS.

Anyone in the Norfolk Children's workforce can request a JAGS. Please take a minute to read the revised guidance and use this <u>MS Form</u> if you would like to request a JAGS.
